Introduction

Some years ago the photographs taken at various Takeley pantomimes were collected together, probably by Les Frost, Takeley school headmaster and a leading figure in producing the pantomimes until 1952. These photographs became part of the Takeley Local History Society collection and now after many years in our care it is time to publish them with all the other information about the Takeley Pantomimes that we can find. Foremost among this additional information are the reports from the Herts and Essex Observer. Pat Salmon passed many hours trawling through back issues of the Herts and Essex Observer extracting anything Takeley related and so we are very lucky that we already have reviews written at the time of the Pantomimes, although more remain to be found. We also have some copies of the programmes – more may be found in the future.

The pantomimes were produced and performed by the Takeley Players as far as we currently know between 1939 and 1957. These are not to be confused with performances by Takeley Drama Group who also performed in the Silver Jubilee Hall from around 1949 to 1961 or a subsequent group who performed in the Silver Jubilee Hall in the 1980s. A separate booklet of photos from the Takeley Drama Group is also being produced alongside this booklet and we recognise that there is work to be done to complete both of these.

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Jan 1939 Cinderella

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer - Saturday January 28th 1939.

Pantomime at Takeley. Local Players in "Cinderella"

There were crowded audiences at the Silver Jubilee Hall at Takeley on Friday and Saturday evenings last week, when the Takeley Players presented " Cinderella", a three act pantomime by K.O. Samuel. The performances were in aid of hall funds. The production was excellently staged and both the scenery and the lighting were attractive and effective. The dialogue was interspersed with popular songs, in the singing of which the audience joined. The cast was;

Fairies; Lillian Francis, M. Ellis, Freda Ellis, Betty Peny and Vera Peachey. The producer was Mr. A. L. Frost. The Carlton Band, directed by Mr. P. H. Puttick, provided the music, much of which was arranged by Miss Peggy Swan.

The principal boy. Miss Florence Smith, carried the part of Prince Charming to an excellent degree. Her solos were well given, like the singing and dancing of Miss Jeanne Sayer (who made a delightful Cinderella), were enthusiastically received. Excellent diction and deportment made Mrs. Lilian Lieber outstanding in her performance in me double role of Fairy Queen and Fairy Godmother, while Colin Frost, as Billy, was able to introduce a great deal of witty humour. The remaining players all gave very sound performances and helped to make the whole production successful and enjoyable.

The scenery was by Mrs. Barbara Nicholson, the stage managers were Messrs J. Morling and R. Kingston, the carpenter and electrician Mr. L. Barltrop and the business manager Mr. J.W.Webb.

At the conclusion of the performance on Friday Mr. A.A.G. Cox, chairman of the Hall Committee, expressed his appreciation and thanks to the producer.

Mr. Frost briefly replied, thanking the band, Mrs. Nicholson and Mr. Barltrop for their part in the success of the show. After Saturday's performance, Mrs. Cox presented bouquets to the Prince, Cinderella and the Fairy Queen, and chocolates to the Ugly Sisters.

This appears to be the first of the Takeley Pantomimes. Florence Smith and Miss Peggy Swan were teachers and Colin Frost was a pupil. The fairies Lilian Francis, Betty Perry and Vera Peachey were all Takeley pupils. Margaret Ellis and Freda Ellis were pupils at Bush End School.

Jan 1940 The Sleeping Beauty



The Takeley Players scored their third success in pantomime, when on Friday and Saturday they played "Red Riding Hood" to crowded audiences at the Jubilee Hall. The production was well staged, beautifully dressed and the scenery and the music were especially good.

In a cast in which every part was adequately filled, it would be unfair to single out any for special distinction, for all gave a real live and whole-hearted performance and well deserved the great ovation they received at the end of the final performance on Saturday night.

The orchestra consisting of Miss Iris Galley (piano). Miss F. Taylor (violin). Mr. Chappell (cello) and Mr. V. Menhinick (drums), was of the greatest assistance to the show, which was produced by Mr. A. L. Frost.

Feb 1943 Beauty and the Beast

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer 20th February 1943.

PANTOMIME BY TAKELEY PLAYERS.

The Pantomime "Beauty and the Beast", adapted from the traditional story by C.B. Abbott and A.L. Frost, was presented at Takeley Village Hall on Friday evening and Saturday afternoon mid evening before large and appreciative audiences. The production was well staged, the lighting and scenery being particularly good. The musical side of the show was in the hands of Miss Iris Galley (piano) and Miss Frances Taylor (violin) and Miss Mary Riches ('cello). The producer was Mr.Frost. The proceeds were for Red Cross Prisoners of War Fund.

All the parts were adequately filled but mention should be made of Mrs. V. Jones, who took the part of the Fairy Queen at a few hours notice and did very well. Miss B. Thurgood was unable to appear on Saturday, owing to illness, but Miss Ruby Taylor ably filled the breach.

There was plenty of popular music in the show and the audiences played their part in the choruses.

At the end of Saturday night's performance, Mr. Frost thanked all who had helped in the success of the show.

Jan 1944 Robin Hood and Babes in the Wood

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer - Friday 15th January 1944.

PANTOMIME - ROBIN HOOD AND THE BABES IN THE WOOD ...

The Takeley Players presented a pantomime "Robin Hood and the Babes in the Wood" to crowded and appreciative audiences at the Village Hall last Friday and Saturday. The proceeds were for the Takeley Branch of the British Legion Fund for local men and women in the Forces.

All the parts were adequately filled, the scenery and lighting were up to the usual high standard of previous years, and the success of the show was in large measure due to the playing of "The Orpheus Trio" consisting of Iris Galley (piano), - Frances Taylor (violin), - and Mary Riches (cello). May 1944 Variety Entertainment

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer - Saturday 6th May 1944.

VARIETY ENTERTAINMENT.

-organised by the Drama Class of Takeley Evening Institute, a programme of variety was presented to a crowded audience at the Village Hall on Thursday evening last week.

The items included -- Tap Dances by Betty Boswell, - Pat Donovan, - Sheila Searle, and Frances Wells, -- Violin Solos by Frances Taylor, -- Ballet Dances by Greta Fraenkel, - Songs by Lillian Staniland, -- and Community singing led by Ron Whitting, pianist and accordionist,

Two plays were given by members of the class, "Eldorado", played by Reg Maryon, Eileen Donovan, John Read and Joyce Daldry. And "Good blood and Bad blood" by Ione Evans, Arthur Staniland, Vera Jones, Rosa Silvester, Lillian Staniland and Jack Searle. Mr A.Frost was the producer. The accompanists were Mr K.Browne and Miss B.South.

May 1945 Queen of Hearts

We have not yet found the Herts and Essex Observer report on the 1945 pantomime which we believe to be Queen of Hearts but we do have a reference to the pantomime in the Parish Council report below although reference to Mr Frost's ill health may be a clue.

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer - Saturday 5th May 1945.

VILLAGE HALL ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Village Hall was held on Wednesday last week, Mr A.A.G.Cox (Chairman of Committee) presiding, supported by Mr E.F.Wright (Hon Secretary) and Mr A.Collison (Hon Treasurer), in his opening remarks the Chairman said as a result of the discussion at the public meeting in 1944, the Committee had decided to prohibit the attendance of children under 14 at public dances. With regard to possible post-war developments he thought it advisable to wait the return of the men and women in the Forces. The Treasurer, presenting his report, referred to the resignation through ill-health of the secretary (Mr Frost), and wished him a speedy recovery and return to public life. The statement of accounts showed a strong financial position, receipts from both entertainment's and lettings being a substantial increase over the previous year, -- Brigadier General Charlton D.S.O. proposed that the accounts be adopted with appreciation of the work of the Committee and officers during the year. The Hon Secretary reported another successful year, seventy dances had been held "without" he was glad to say, "any kind of trouble" There had also been nine concerts and the usual pantomime by the Takeley Players. Other big events were the Women's Institute sale of work in aid of the Red Cross P.O.W.Fund, and the Anglo-Soviet Committee's Garden Show for Soviet Medical Aid. He estimated that approximately £1,000 had been raised in the Hall for various charities during the year. The Ministry of Information had provided several interesting and instructive film shows, and there would be others in the near future. After the adoption of the new Committee there was a general discussion. Questions were asked as to the use of the Hall as a school canteen, and in reply it was pointed out that the Education Authority would probably provide their own building for this purpose as soon as practicable. In closing the meeting the Chairman expressed his personal regret at the loss of Mr Frost's services as secretary, and thanked the Committee, the officers and other helpers for their work.

Jan 1946 Aladdin and the Wonderful Lamp

Report in the Herts & Essex Observer - Friday 2nd February 1946.

PANTOMIME - ALADDIN AND THE WONDERFUL LAMP.

The Takeley Players produced their annual pantomime at the Village Hall on Friday and Saturday to large and appreciative audiences. This years choice was "Aladdin and the Wonderful Lamp" and the production was in the hands of the Rev R.A.D.Heath, Mr Frost, who has been the producer for the past seven years, having resigned owing to ill-health.

The exacting part of Aladdin was in the capable hands of Lillian Staniland, who sang and acted throughout with confidence and skill. Sheila Searle as the Princess did well in her first big role, her diction and dancing being particularly good. As Widow Twankey, Jack Searle was a great success, and he was ably aided and abetted in supplying the comic element by John Read as Sing Sing. Arthur Staniland an old hand at villain's roles, was excellent as the African Magician, his make up and costume being very effective. All the minor parts were satisfactorily played, and the dancing of the chorus, imps and fairies was of a good standard.

The orchestra, led by Edith Kingston, added the right touch of gaiety to the proceedings, and mention must be made of the excellent work of Clive Dobson at the drums.

At the close of Saturday evening's performance, Mr C Wright (chairman of the parish council) thanked the producer for the excellent show, and in replying the Rev R.A.D.Heath paid a generous tribute to the assistance he had received from the late producer Mr Frost.

The proceeds were for the Takeley Welcome Home Fund.

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

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

TAKELEY PLAYERS ---- THE SLEEPING BEAUTY.

The Takeley Players presented "The Sleeping Beauty" a pantomime in three acts, by K.O.Samuel, at the Silver Jubilee Hall, Takeley, Friday and Saturday. Mr. A. L. Frost was the producer. The best laughs of the evening came from the excellent clowning of Hyacinth, (a cook, played by Jack Searle), and her bald-headed boyfriend Goldilocks (a waiter, played by Reg Maryon.) 





Stevenson's story needs no recapitulation; suffice it to say that the east captured the spirit of adventure, and played their parts with such verve that there was never a dull moment.



VILLAGE PRODUCER

It was 15 years ago that, Mr A.L.Frost founded the Takeley Players. He has just relinquished the honorary job of producer, having seen this group achieve quite a notable place among village dramatic societies. Under his guidance they have presented a wide range of programmes, including no fewer that 12 full scale pantomimes. During the war years they raised considerable sums of money for local and national charities. Past members of the Players include Mr Joseph Gunyon, who later became producer to the Takeley and Dunmow Drama Club, and Miss Iris Galley, the present conductor of Bishop's Stortford Musical Association. Their fine stock of scenery was largely the work of Miss Barbara Nicholson, daughter of the late Sir Charles Nicholson.

PRESENTATION.

At a meeting at the school on Wednesday last week, Mr A.L.Frost, who is retiring after 15 years as producer to Takeley Players, was presented with a portable radio set subscribed for by past and present members. The presentation was made by Mr W.J.Finch, secretary of the Saffron Walden, Dunmow and District Youth Committee who spoke of the work Mr Frost had done for the Players. In reply Mr Frost thanked Mr Finch and all who had subscribed towards the gift. It was suggested that use might be made of the coming public meeting to raise the matter of recruits for Civil Defence. - Mrs Muir reported that the Bus Shelter Fund now stood at £82 and it was hoped building would begin shortly.

With scarcely a pause the curtain rose again on the pantomime proper, Mary Procter as the Demon King giving the right air of mystery to come in her speech and movements, The Widow Readie, played in hilarious style by John Read, soon had the audience on her side against Mr Egg, the bailiff (Ron Silvester) and Mr Chips his assistant (Sylvie Ebert), both of whom acted with enthusiasm and imagination, Marjorie Jones as Oderous Egg (The Bailiff's Sister) took their wisecracks on the chin and emerged victorious with Mr Chips for a husband.

Jack, Widow Readie's lazy son, was ably played by Joyce Silvester, although playing minor roles during the past two years, Miss Silvester took the principle part in a carefree manner, and gave a well acted performance as the ne'er do well who sold Claribelle the cow, for a bag of beans.

Claribelle a docile creature, was activated by Ronald Silvester and Barry Causton, as the old lady who bought the cow, Muriel Silvester gave a sincere performance, Jill Monk a newcomer to the company was good as Jill, the giants servant, who proved to be a Princess stolen at birth, Jack Searle, as the Giant Snuffle-gobbler, caused much excitement.

THE MAGIC HEN.

Gillian Jones performance as the magic hen who laid the golden eggs, and later became the rejuvenated fairy, was well done. The older fairy, played by Madge Macfarlane, was also well received, causing much laughter in her battles with the Demon King.

Noni Shuttlewood played the Herald; the chorus work was supplied by Kathleen Whyman and Margaret Lee, and some entertaining dances were given by Joan Morrison and Dorothy Silvester.

The stage management was in the hands of Beryl Tetley-Jones, assisted by Anne Rushen, Jean Venning, the prompter, had very little to do; the pianist was David Jones and the drummer was Peter Dorrington. The electricians were Leon Easter and Clive Dobson whose work contributed to the enjoyment of the show.

The Prologue costumes, designed by Marjorie Jones, showed much thought and care. The producer is to be congratulated on the keenness and team work in her company, and for introducing new members into the cast.



THE PIED PIPER' AT TAKELEY.

For their l9th production in as many years, presented at the Silver Jubilee Hall last Thursday and Saturday, the Takeley Players' choice was The Pied Piper. Modern Hamelin is still haunted by the legend, and the Rat-Catchers House kept as a museum where visitors can see manuscripts and statues which concern it.

Although beset by many difficulties this year, petrol rationing preventing some of the cast from continuing with rehearsals and John Read, who has delighted audiences for many years as the traditional "Dame", breaking his leg on the football field just five weeks ago, the company carried on.

By way of compensation they were joined at a late hour by Peter Jannaway, who took over the part of Lotto the Dame, which he played in confident and pleasing way. He was particularly happy when singing to the children, who quite obviously enjoyed their part in this production.

A PROLOGUE.

For the benefit of the younger members of the village a prologue entitled "Hamelin Hideaway" was written by the producer. It showed the Rats and Mice gathered in the cellar beneath the Town Hall, preparing to open their attack on the Town of Hamelin. Gillian Jones as Prolog, the Spirit of Pantomime, looked mtractive and spoke her lines well. Carol Lee, Margaret Firkins, Carroll Willis, Gillian Digby and Susan Collins respectively As Bossy, Scout, General, Boy and Girl Rat, took the principal parts. Wendy Halls, Elizabeth Mitchell, Christine Silvester and Patricia Smith as The Working Rats, with Marilyn Barker, Sally Deval and Patricia Rickett as The Lazy Rats, all spoke their parts well, coping bravely with verse and long words. The mice, six very small members played by Julie Attwood, Jennifer Boswell, June Pallett, Janet Rickett, Eileen Vigor and Viviene Willis, delighted audiences with their zeal in proving they were fit to join the Rat Company.

SUCCESSFUL PIPER In the pantomime proper, the part of The Pied Piper was played by Ann Jones with great success, a special feature being she played her own pipe.

Derek Turner as The Mayor of Hamelin, looking very elegant, failed rather to carry weight in his part, and his scenes with Ronald Silvester as Otto Blotto, fell rather flat, and they did not always seem confident in their parts. Mitzi, the Mayor's daughter, was played by Dorothy Silvester, who not only looked charming on the stage, but held her part throughout with sincerity, insisting on paying the Piper and protecting her villainous father at the same time.

As Carl the Woodcutter, her sister Joyce Silvester made an attractive looking principal boy. Schniff the Innkeeper was played by James Firkins, and Noni Shuttlewood as Katchen, a stallholder, gave to this small part a delightful light-hearted-ness.

Whiskers and Friskers, two Rats who are saved from drowning, were amusingly played by Sylvia Ebert and Muriel Silvester. They brought a modern touch into the fairy tale by performing a rock and roll dance.

Some amusing light comedy was confidently handled by Marjorie Jones as Gerda, the Innkeeper's daughter, her partner Hanz Heinz, played by Madge MacFarlane, who started courting her in Act 1, being firmly told to wait until the finale for an answer.

As Johnny the lame boy, who in this story is fortunately cured by the Piper, Gillian Jones gave a sincere and touching performance.

TYROLEAN COSTUME.

Peter Stevens was a councillor and the townswomen Carol Phillips, Beryl Digby and Joan Attridge.

The children of Hamelin who disappeared into the mountain were Christine Boswell (Greta), Antionette Wilkinson (Gretchen), Wendy English (Joseph) and Pauline Wilkinson (Peter). Tyrolean costume was chosen for its simplicity and gay colouring; the entirely new set of scenery for four scenes was designed and painted by Rosemary Herring. Together with excellent lighting effects achieved by Clive Dobson and Leon Easter these added considerably to the enjoyment of this production by Madge MacFarlane. The stage management went smoothly in the capable hands of Beryl Tetley Jones, who was assisted by Sylvia Ebert. The prompter was Millicent Felgate. Carol Pallett at the piano helped greatly by her accompanying and effects throughout the production.
